

CONFERENCE OVERVIEW

Conference History: In 1999, the Missouri Valley Association of Fire Chiefs approached a group of fire and burn public educators in Kansas with a proposal to host an annual public education conference. The first conference was held in Wichita, Kansas in 2000. Since that time, this annual conference has rotated to other cities and is now returning to Wichita for the Sixth Annual Fire, Burn and Life Safety Public Education Conference.

Conference Focus and Target Audience: Reel in Winning Strategies by Using the Right Bait! is targeted for fire, burn and life safety educators (novice to expert) who are concerned about the fire and burn problem in their communities. The conference will offer many opportunities to learn from the experts and each other about strategies we can all use to mitigate the fire and burn injuries and deaths.

One of the strong focuses for this year's conference is "small actions lead to big consequences" and the importance of primary prevention - stopping the fire and/or burn before there are consequences. The conference will end with a panel discussion of survivors - people whose lives have been forever changed because of a fire or burn incident. The conference will conclude by bringing your focus back to the real reason why we are involved in public education - the human element.

GENERAL SESSIONS

Keynote Address and Thursday Evening Activity

On Thursday morning, Carr Hagerman from Charthouse Learning will present the Fish! Philosophy. The Fish! Philosophy is inspired by the fishmongers of Seattle's Pike Place Fish Market. Despite a very difficult work environment, they have found ways to bring remarkable energy, commitment and creativity to their own work. The Fish! Philosophy will show attendees how to bring more fun, passion, focus and commitment to their own work.

On Thursday evening, participants and guests are invited to attend a Fish! Fry. Mr. Hagerman will lead the group in a fun, interactive activity applying what he shared in his morning keynote address. There will be prizes awarded to the best-dressed fisherman or fisherwoman so come dressed for fishing.

After the Fire, After the Burn. Enhancing survivals and outcomes

This session will focus on the human consequences of fire and burn injuries, new innovations and technology that allow for 95 percent of those admitted to burn centers to survive.

After the Fire, After the Burn: It Happened to Me

A panel of burn and fire survivors will share what they have learned and how they use their experiences to help others.

Burn and Fire Disasters: Past, Present and Future Threats

Lessons learned and the role of the public educator in preventing public assembly related fire injuries and deaths will be discussed.

Changing Paradigms in Fire Safety and Burn Prevention

Theories behind changes in fire safety and burn prevention messages and the role of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and the American Burn Association (ABA) in creating and disseminating messages that are consistent in language and actions will be addressed. This topic should lead to some lively discussion and interaction.

Communication Skills

During "Hi-Tech Communication in a Hi-Tech Era" (general session) and "Crisis Communication: When the Lights are Hot and the Questions Tough" (breakout session) you will learn skills that will help you communicate whether you are dealing with one person, a group, or the media.

Legislative Issues in Fire Safety and Burn Prevention

Find out what is happening on a national level with fire safety and burn prevention initiatives, legislation, standards, and public policy. Discover how you can get involved and make a difference.

What's New in Youth Firesetting Assessment and Intervention

During this session, Pat Mieszala will describe successful youth intervention strategies and programs and how to recognize and develop effective program tools and strategies in youth intervention.

Outcome Measurements: We Are Trying SOMETHING NEW and EXCITING!

Outcomes relating to public education conferences are very difficult to measure. This year, we are going to try something new. NFPA 1035 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist I (JFSIS I) Class and Certification Test

JFSIS I will provide the participant the knowledge and skills to successfully conduct an interview with a firesetter and his or her family using prepared forms and guidelines and who, based on recommended practice, can determine the need for referral for counseling, implement intervention strategies, or both, to mitigate the effects of firesetting behavior. This class is being offered by Kansas Fire and Rescue Training Institute and will be taught by Pat Mieszala.
